

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

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

THESIS STATEMENT

Parks and land conservancies can move beyond symbolic land acknowledgments to foster deeper, more collaborative relationships with the Indigenous communities whose land they occupy. Through interpretive design, placemaking, and the intentional use of narrative, these spaces can reflect Indigenous presence, values, and environmental knowledge in ways that resonate with land organizations, visitors, and Indigenous communities alike.

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
SUBJECT

Beyond Land Acknowledgments

Public parks and land conservancies increasingly include land acknowledgments. Yet these statements often remain symbolic, describing Indigenous peoples in the past tense, rarely recognizing their ongoing presence or contributions. Indigenous communities maintain deep histories tied to these lands and possess living knowledge grounded in language, seasonal cycles, & plant relationships. Specifically, the Ojibwe language encodes ecological knowledge, place-based identity, and reciprocal relationships with the land, while contemporary ethnobotanical practices demonstrate that these teachings are actively practiced today. This thesis explores how parks can move beyond symbolic acknowledgments by integrating the living Indigenous perspectives into the parks interpretive and spatial design.

Pimachiowin Aki

Prioritizes placing Ojibwe language and contemporary plant-based practices at the center of interpreting the region's landscapes. Through seasonal storytelling, interactive language experiences, and engagement with the Four Sacred Medicines, the exhibit demonstrates that Indigenous presence is living and ongoing. Visitors are invited to see the land through Ojibwe perspectives, fostering a reciprocal, culturally informed relationship with the places Minnesota parks occupy, rather than viewing Indigenous presence as solely historical.

Before entering the garden, guests learn how Ojibwe culture defines the four seasons. In a large-scale storybook, they explore each season and choose the one that resonates the most with them for the garden.
